One Dollar for Life (ODFL), the Girls' Equality Project

Girls in the developing world miss school one week a month once they start their periods. After about a year they drop out of school because they are so far behind. They become second-class citizens for the rest of their lives. At about age 13, their choices are grim - they can become domestic servants, get some other menial, low-paying job, get married, or be sold into the sex trade. The problem affects 50 million girls a year. ODFL's Girls' Equality Project is working to change this situation by providing washable sanitary supplies to girls in some of the poorest countries in the world. Kits cost \$5 each and last for 3 years—usually long enough for the girls to finish school. Donations help the poorest girls in the world have the same educational opportunities as boys. www.odfl.org


California Nevada Conference Disaster Response Fund

SEEDS

Plant hope, change lives. The mission of SEEDS is to provide direct and immediate care to kids living on the streets through the combined efforts of the Street Outreach Team, the Palo Alto FUMC Outreach Center, and Mobile Street Ministry. Over time, this care fosters a connection which can forge long term relationships, allowing young people to find sanctuary even while on the streets. These relationships empower young people to consider viable options to move off the streets into safe and sustainable living situations. Services currently supported by your donations include: distribution of LifePack street survival kits. weekly meals and supplies provided at the outreach center, transportation stipends, counseling referrals, and resources to gain access to employment and educational opportunities. www.myseeds.org.



Pastors' Discretionary Fund

This fund allows our pastors to confidentially provide small gifts of money to congregation members in financial crisis and to the increasing number of jobless and homeless people who come to our church for help. Ecumenical Hunger Program (EHP)

EHP is an independent, nonprofit organization located in East Palo Alto. EHP aids local families and individuals who are experiencing economic and personal hardship, helping them regain stability and independence. EHP's holiday food program is a special distribution of food items for the holidays. These boxes include everything that a family might need to make Christmas dinner with plenty of leftovers for the following week. EHP also provides personal care packages to families struggling to secure everyday essentials such as soap, shampoo and toilet paper. At Christmas, gift cards are given to teenagers, who often serve a caretaker role in their families, looking after younger siblings, filling in for working parents who cannot afford childcare.
