First Palo Alto Provided Meals and Shelter for Hotel de Zink in June

The month of June has come and gone and so have our annual Hotel de Zink guests. This year 16 men and women stayed overnight in Kohlstedt Hall from June 1 through June 30 with the Hotel de Zink emergency shelter program which is run by LifeMoves (https://lifemoves.org/).

Clients arrived each evening to dinner prepared and served at 9 p.m. by groups, families or individuals in our congregation. There was a wide variety of dishes and the guests loved the dinners. They would come into the kitchen each night eager to see what was on offer.

Guests spent the night at the church, sleeping on mats in Kohlstedt Hall. LifeMoves staff were in attendance throughout the night. First Palo Alto provided access to a shower and clean towels every day.

Our church also provided breakfast and lunch items that were very much appreciated. After spending the night, guests ate breakfast and prepared take-away lunches. They left in the morning, returning again in the evening.



It took around 60 people to make Hotel de Zink work at our church this year. Some provided meals or paper goods; others provided breakfast and lunch fixings. Each week had an individual or couple as coordinator. The weekly coordinators were crucial in keeping things running smoothly. Others (but mostly one faithful person, Nancy Olson) supplied our guests with clean towels each day.

Thank you to all for your kindness and caring.

Hotel de Zink is Palo Alto's only homeless shelter, serving roughly 100 people each year. For the past 27 years, 12 mid-peninsula churches have taken turns each month to provide food and shelter for 15–16 men and women who are in transition and without stable housing.

Rev. Dr. Murray is a passionate pastor, preacher, teacher, author, and leadership consultant. She is affectionately known as the Soul Dr. because she uses "God's purpose" as a starting

place for all endeavors. She has traveled to more than 21 countries sharing the gospel and advocating for equity and justice for all. She began her role as Senior Pastor here at First Palo Alto on July 1.

Rev. Dr. Murray uses her 15 years as an executive with AT&T and Lucent Technologies to assist nonprofits and faith-based community organizations in visioning, strategy and development, and capacity building. As a Professional Spiritual Life Coach and Multicultural Leadership Consultant, she assists corporations and individuals to "restart" their businesses and lives by changing their "mindsets" and "setting their intentions" to live on purpose and not by default. Rev. Dr. Murray is the President of Simple Strategies for Success; a nonprofit devoted to skill building, counseling and microbusiness development for women with children living in impoverished areas around the world.

Rev. Dr. Murray's formal training consists of a Doctorate of Ministry in Christian Leadership and Biblical Preaching from Asbury Theological Seminary's Beeson International Scholars Program, a Master of Divinity from Union Theological Seminary, and a Master of Arts in Organizational Management from the University of Phoenix. Rev. Dr. Murray is also an itinerant elder in the A.M.E. church.

She was formerly Senior Pastor of Tongan, Samoan, and English congregations at Waianae United Methodist Church (WUMC) in Oahu, Hawaii. WUMC is a multicultural congregation with 17 different blended ethnicities.

Welcoming Rev. Maile Koloto as Our New Associate Pastor



Rev. Maile Tongi'one Koloto is no stranger to First Palo Alto UMC. He served here as the lay leader for the Tongan Fellowship in 1984–1989 together with his late wife Latu Eveline Koloto and their two children, son Sailosisavu and daughter Mary Hau'alofa'ia. He thinks of this place as home. We gladly welcome Rev. Maile Koloto back to First Palo Alto. Rev. Koloto devotes himself to serving God and all people.

"Koe lelei kuou ngaue kiai, koe lelei ma'ae kakai. Koe hala fononga peia, kihe fonua 'o e monu'ia." "The greatest gift I can give someone, is giving them my best. That is the way of my desire to serve where blessings overflow."

In 1993 Rev. Koloto became the Associate Pastor for the Palo Alto Tongan congregation, then was called to Laurel UMC in Oakland in 2001. He spent 10 years there working passionately with his family and community to put teenagers through school and encourage higher education by setting up after school programs with access to computers, teacher volunteers, and internships across the nation. As Oakland has one of the nation's highest city crime rates, Rev. Koloto and his family sought ways to keep the youth and young adults of the community aware and safe by forming ministries with the community and different ethnicities and using the church as a place to bring young people together.

In 2011 Rev. Koloto and his family served First Tongan UMC of San Bruno for two years. There he was able to start up a Second Harvest Food Bank twice a month and a meal for the neighborhood's homeless each Sunday morning.

Before being called back to First Palo Alto, Rev. Koloto served at Fale Hufanga Tongan UMC in San Carlos. There Maile and his family laid Latu to rest in eternal peace in 2015.



Hello First Palo Alto readers! For the next few months, I'll be shining the spotlight on some of the illustrators that bring the books in our library to life with their vibrant works. (In the last issue we focused on illustrator Teagan White.) This month the spotlight is on illustrator Gregory Copeland.



If you're a fan of Penguin's "Who HQ" series, then you already know the work of Gregory Copeland, who illustrates all the books in this series of nonfiction historical and science chapter books for young readers. It's easy to recognize the oversized heads of the (kind) caricatures of historical figures that feature on every cover, but Copeland also draws the realistic black and white graphite illustrations and maps and diagrams you'll find inside Who HQ books. Copeland's work strikes a balance between realism and a soft, welcoming warmth that makes

him ideal for illustrating children's nonfiction.

You can find Who HQ biographies for Coretta Scott King, Neil Armstrong, and Jane Goodall in the church library, and be sure to keep a lookout for more upcoming Who HQ books on topics like the history of rock and roll, Woodstock, and Alcatraz.


• UMW Circle and Interest Groups are taking vacation during the summer while so many are traveling. Activities will resume in September.

Keep Cool!

by Nancy Olson As unpredictable as our weather has become, we know and accept that August will have some warmer than usual temperatures. When

looking for ways to cool our houses, there are some old fashioned methods that still work: closing shades on the sunny side of the house; opening windows (with screens in good repair) to provide a cross breeze and night cooling; checking the status of attic insulation (rebates are often available).

It is a good time to check our irrigation systems for leaks that waste water and increase our water bills. Adding mulch to flower beds can conserve moisture. Check the frequency of sprinkler systems—need varies with each season.

The City of Palo Alto Utilities offers rebates to Palo Alto residents who replace a high water use landscape with a qualifying low water use landscape. Pre-inspection is required.

There are also rebates available for home improvements that help conserve water: rain barrels, cisterns, green roofs, permeable pavements. For more information and application forms: www.cityofpaloalto.org/stormwater

Please remember that if you need to drain your pool, spa or fountain, *drain to your sewer cleanout*. Do *not* drain to the curb/gutter as this drains directly to our creeks and the Bay. Remember that to conserve water, pools should only be drained to stabilize water hardness or to make a repair.

City residents are reminded that many of our actions affect our Bay. In the privacy of our homes, we often think we can get rid of lots off things by flushing them away. But we need to realize that *toilets are not trash cans*. Even though labels on some baby wipes and kitty litter

claim to be flushable, they should not be flushed. Things like cotton balls, hair, dental floss, and cosmetic or disposable wipes should not be flushed. Only three things should be flushed: water, human waste and toilet paper. Let's smile and keep cool. (I always think smiling is cooling maybe the heat has affected me....)

Impact Investing Can Create Societal Benefits and Financial Returns

As I have previously reported, I coach East African local companies for the Stanford Seed program. Here is an update on one of my client companies, Ten Senses, an agribusiness in Kenya.



Invitation for the Launch of the Cashew Nuts and Sesame Value Chain Project, Kilifi

The ambassadors of the Visegrad Group (v4—Czech Republic, Hungary, Slovakia, and Poland), the ambassador of the European Union to Kenya, Farm Africa and Ten Senses kindly invite you to the official launch event of the joint V4 development project to support Kenyan Farmers.

This event took place in June in Kilifi, a coastal town on the Indian Ocean in Kenya, at the Ten Senses Africa cashew nursery.

The joint 4-year project aims at improving social and economic conditions of small-scale holder farmers. The project aims at planting one million cashew trees and leading to food security, job creation and income generation for 15,000 farmers.

This project is building on Fair Trade and Organic certification with a focus on Agricultural Value Chain development.

The news here is that for-profit companies making a large social impact are getting funding in the form of both grants and investments from International Government Organizations (INGOs). Adding 15,000 "indirect" jobs for these currently subsistence farmers will be a real win-win for them, Ten Senses and the Kenyan economy. The farmers will have a ready market for their farmed nuts, training, access to equipment, better seedlings and earn a living wage. I have seen examples of this model in West Africa with cassava (5,000 farmers), shea nuts (5,000 women), coconut oil (5,000 farmers), and now cashew and macadamia nuts in Kenya for an additional 15,000 cashew growing farmers in addition to 6,000 macadamia farmers.

Social impact investments make a lot of sense in the developing world. Impact investing focuses on investing in companies or organizations to create a measurable societal benefit and generate a financial return. In addition to agribusiness, impact investing is typically centered around


addressing a social issue, such as poverty or education, or an environmental issue, such as clean water. Increasing jobs, whether indirectly (as providers of raw materials) or directly, (factory workers) is the key for the economic development in a region.

Conclusion

In addition to this 2 million EURO grant, Ten Senses just closed on an equity round of \$2 million from a Dutch Social Impact Fund.
