Pastoral Prayer Reverend Dr. Debra Murray

Dear Lord I offer this prayer of mourning and lament to you today because Black Lives Matter. Just when I think my weeping is over, a tsunami of grief overtakes me. Lord not only am I grieving, but our nation is grieving. We are grieving over the demonic actions we have witnessed in our local communities. Our souls and psyches have been etched with the sounds of the gasps of George Floyd's last breaths as he cried out for his Mother and to officer Chauvin "I can't breathe." We witnessed Ahmaud's last leisurely strides and heard his tennis shoes hit the pavement as he was gunned down by an off duty officer while jogging down the street. And we witnessed the bullet-ridden body of Breonna Taylor in her bed where she lay asleep during a no-knock warrant.

Lord we grieve for the thousands of other African American lives that have been murdered unnecessarily because of the pervasive and systemic police brutality and disregard for Black Life. We lift up the thousands more who have been murdered on and off camera yet have not received any attention or justice. We grieve for the millions who have been on the systemic conveyor belt of mass incarceration from stolen childhood to prisonhood. We ask that your loving comfort and mercy be upon their families and this nation. Lord, we have witnessed far too many unholy things this week.

Lord, we ask for your intervening mercy on the demonstrators who risk their lives to protest the acute onchronic racism against Black and Brown Bodies in these yet to be United States. Lord, we pray for those protestors who were called thugs by the President and who felt his military assault of flash bombs and pepper spray. Lord, we grieve the raiding of disenfranchised communities and also grieve for those of privilege as we lift up the unrest within the world. We ask for your peace and guidance because all of your creation matters. God, we know we cannot merely pray to you, to bring an end to injustice;

For we have the power to create peace,

We know we cannot merely pray to You, O God, to end starvation;

For You have already given us the resources to feed the entire world.

We cannot merely pray to You, O God, to root out prejudice;

For You have already made us in your divine image with the eyes to see one another as ourselves,

We cannot merely pray to You, O God, to end despair;

For You have already given us innovation to redevelop our slums and to give hope, if we would only use our power justly.

We cannot merely pray to You, O God, to end disease;

For You have already given us scientific and homeopathic wisdom to cure and heal, if we would only use them constructively and not with greed.

We cannot merely pray to You to transform our world for you have already given us power to do so Therefore we pray to You instead, O God, for strength, determination and will power,

To become, instead of merely to wish.

Vaccinations for the Coronavirus: Discipleship

The Lord be with you.
And also with you.
Lift up your hearts.
We lift them up to the Lord.
Let us give thanks to the Lord our God.
It is right to give our thanks and praise.

It is right, and a good and joyful thing everywhere to give thanks to you, Almighty God, creator of heaven and earth. You formed us in your image and breathed into us the breath of life. When we turned away, and our love failed, your love remained steadfast. You delivered us from captivity, made covenant to be our sovereign God, and spoke to us through the prophets. And so, with your people on earth and all the company of heaven we praise your name and join their unending hymn:

Holy, holy, holy Lord, God of power and might, heaven and earth are full of your glory. Hosanna in the highest. Blessed is he who comes in the name of the Lord. Hosanna in the highest. (p. 25)

Holy are you, and blessed is your Son Jesus Christ. Your Spirit anointed him to preach good news to the poor, to proclaim release to the captives and recovering of sight to the blind, to set at liberty those who are oppressed, and to announce that the time had come when you would save your people. He healed the sick, fed the hungry, and ate with sinners. By the baptism of his suffering, death, and resurrection you gave birth to your Church, delivered us from slavery to sin and death, and made with us a new covenant by water and the Spirit. When the Lord Jesus ascended, he promised to be with us always, in the power of your Word and Holy Spirit.

On the night in which he gave himself up for us, he took bread, gave thanks to you, broke the bread, gave it to his disciples, and said: "Take, eat; this is my body which is given for you. Do this in remembrance of me."

When the supper was over, he took the cup, gave thanks to you, gave it to his disciples, and said: "Drink from this, all of you; this is my blood of the new covenant, poured out for you and for many for the forgiveness of sins. Do this, as often as you drink it, in remembrance of me."

And so, in remembrance of these your mighty acts in Jesus Christ, we offer ourselves in praise and thanksgiving as a holy and living sacrifice, in union with Christ's offering for us, as we proclaim the mystery of faith.

Christ has died; Christ is risen; Christ will come again. (p. 25)

Pour out your Holy Spirit on us gathered here, and on these gifts of bread and wine. Make them be for us the body and blood of Christ, so that through them, we may be Christ's body alive in the world. By your Spirit make us one with Christ, one with each other, and one in ministry to all the world, until Christ comes in final victory and we feast at his heavenly banquet. Through your Son Jesus Christ, with the Holy Spirit in your holy Church, all honor and glory is yours, almighty God, now and forever.
