### **Now Better Prepared for Emergencies**


Centennial Endowment Funds (CEF) grant report

Steve Wood helped evaluate the church emergency response procedure document as part of a broader team effort on evaluating site security at the First United Methodist Church of Palo Alto. After reviewing the document, Steve was interested in improving and updating the

emergency supplies stored on site.


Steve conferred with others and brought forward a specific proposal with equipment and supplies. He also identified a storage location and gained consensus on repurposing the location for emergency supply storage. Trustees supported the proposal and sponsored a CEF grant. The Emergency Supplies grant was approved in the fall of 2023 and Steve has now completed implementation.

The Emergency Supplies location is the outdoor closet in the play yard on

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### Dear friends,

Summer is upon us and as I write, the temperature is comfortably in the high 70s. Sitting at my desk, with the fan blowing, I feel grateful to be here. This month is generally quiet here at First Palo Alto UMC with local public schools beginning classes August 14th and 15th, as families and folks get back into the swing of things. Stanford starts the school year more than a month

later, while TRU school holds a week of summer sessions from August 12-16, before starting its fall semester August 29th right here at First Church!

This month's worship series, "First Palo Alto United Methodist Church at the Movies!" is a bit unusual. But I thought it would be nice to look at our religious and spiritual life through another lens, one that seems independent of the church.

Movies were initially created well over 130 years ago; the first films were quite short, a minute long or less, viewed by an individual using a kinetoscope, a large box with a keyhole opening. By 1900, technical improvements made longer films possible as well as the ability to more easily project them onto a screen for a larger audience to watch at the same time. By the first decade of the 20th century, movies had become the most popular entertainment in all major cities and were becoming more common even in smaller towns and more out of the way locations. As a result, movies have been a significant part of our culture, as entertainment, as education, and at their best, as inspiration for more than seven generations.

I have selected two well-known films which you are probably familiar with for August. They are "The Wizard of Oz" and "Casablanca." In addition, two other films—"It's a Wonderful Life" and "The Empire Strikes Back"—will be the subjects of sermons later this year. All of these movies are classic, included on the 'best of' lists from across the nation and around the world. Two of them were not terribly successful when first released (one did very poorly indeed) while the other two were big hits right away. Each feature strong characters and powerful stories that challenge and transform both the players and the audience who watch their struggles. All four use light as well as dramatic scenes, and use music to drive the story, from "Ding Dong the Witch is Dead" to "As Time Goes By."

Since we will not project these on the screen in the sanctuary, I encourage you to watch the films ahead of time. Find them at your local library or online at Amazon, Hulu, YouTube, or MAX. But if you cannot watch the films beforehand, don't worry. I will fill you in on the storyline each Sunday as we explore the gifts to be found in each of them.

### **Take-Aways from Annual Conference**

The 176th session of the California-Nevada Annual Conference of the United Methodist Church met June 7-10 this year in Sacramento. Clergy and laity from the United Methodist churches in Northern California and Nevada gathered together for this session. Rev. Burke Owens and designated lay members Diane and Rick Allen attended as representatives of the First United Methodist Church of Palo Alto.

Some take-aways from the Northern California-Nevada Annual Conference for our local church include:

- Pastor Burke Owens was reappointed to our church for the church year starting July 1, 2024.
- Pastor Sepuloni Feleunga of the Palo Alto First Tongan United Methodist Church was ordained as an Elder and a member in full connection.
- The conference recommends every church study the Social Principles approved by the General Conference after 12 years of worldwide input and revision.
- The conference recommends every church study the implications of the proposed constitutional amendments to regionalize the United Methodist Church. Our Annual Conference will be voting on these regionalization amendments in 2025.

The purpose of this annual meeting is to worship together, make decisions regarding conference budget and procedures, and celebrate milestones such as ordinations, retirements, and lives of clergy and spouses who have died in the past year. This year we had the additional joy of hearing about the May 2024 UMC General

Conference which met in April in Charlotte, North Carolina.

Here's a tasty way to fight climate change: prevent food waste!

In July 2021, 26% of Palo Alto's residential garbage was food that went bad and was thrown away. Preventing food waste saves more than landfill space—it is one of the top ways to reduce greenhouse gases. To promote programs that supported the city sustainability goal, the City of Palo Alto added a Compost program to the existing curbside garbage and recycling programs.

This new program made it easy for residents to dispose of unwanted, uneaten food as well as peels, shells, bones, food soiled paper, and yard debris. This material would then become high quality compost available free to residents for improving yards and gardens.

Unfortunately, many residents do not use this handy and environmentally beneficial program, instead continuing to put food related items into the "garbage." 135 million tons of greenhouse gas emissions are created by the food we never eat.

The United States throws away roughly 35% of our total food supply each year. It turns out one reason so much perfectly usable food goes to waste is the current patchwork of date labels used across different food products, which can often be more








## Church Library Starts Large Print Section





In most cases, if not all, there is no indication that after such date, the food is still useable, safe to eat, and nutritious. If it isn't "pretty," it still makes a tasty stir fry or yummy addition to stew or soup. Search websites for recipes using leftover ingredients.

Help reduce food waste and you will be helping reduce greenhouse gases. •
